Agenda topic *Solutions*

- Dr. Julie Kellogg: Currently have 30 residents in the program, 10 will be graduating each year. Hoping this will help to bridge the gap-formalized curriculum includes ADHD lectures and imbedding psychology into their curriculum (ACGME/AAFP). Family doctors can treat ADHD on established patients. Changes occur in insurance at the age of 18, clinic can help bridge the transition of care. AAP-primary care doctor should assess children and treat ADHD.
- Dr. Childers: 80% of children with concordance of ADHD have a parent who also has ADHD. The parent needs to seek treatment with family doctor as well, in order to create a stable environment.
- Dr. Hogan: UNF has a new DNP program for ARNP comprehensive, post master's certificate for mental health. 1st cohort of ten will be ready soon and in the fall another 20 will be ready. The challenge is finding the required 630 clinical hours of experience, because they cannot bill.
- Dr. Childers stated that his office may be able to take one graduate student per year.
- ANCC certified. 2 years psycho-pharm. counseling, therapy courses, diagnosis management.
- Dr. Chenot: Legal Issues- Please review journal article (Berryessa, 2017) – As many as half of adults with ADHD develop a substance abuse disorder in their lifetime. Their ADHD goes untreated and they start to self-medicate and engage in risky behaviors in order to be accepted. When they get arrested, the judge may not know about their diagnosis.

Agenda topic *Research*

- Dr. Alloway: Psychology professor and Graduate Program Director at the University of North Florida. She has written over 100 articles. Her expertise is in working memory research, looking at how ADHD impacts education and memory. Visual working memory is affected, can be a predictor of academic failure. She is currently working with school psychologists. If a student is allowed to move and fidget, it frees up the brain to focus on the learning. Exercise has positive outcome on working memory. - Grants/Funding- money is out there-has any one pursued grant funds? An ADHD CPC team applied for but did not receive a \$300K grant. How do we get funding?
- Identifying "hot topics" once program is established then it is easier to get further funding.

Need to educate parents of where does the ADHD come from, parent may need treatment as well. Need to create some marketing- possibly a flyer that can be sent out to parents and doctors with topic information.
