A Parent Educational Engagement Partner, or PEEP, will Support, Engage and Educate parents and their child

in the area of exceptional student educational services by increasing parental involvement, building their knowledge and confidence, and providing overall support all with a goal of ultimately improving the child's academic achievement over time.

Specialized PEEP Training and Resources in IDEA (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act), Individualized Education Plans (IEPs), and Peer-to-Peer Support is the foundational knowledge and expertise shared by PEEPs with parents. The PEEP is a specially trained parent of a child with a disability in the school district, who has learned through their experience that positive teamwork among schools, agencies and families is the key to a child's success.



PEEPs provide information to parents about resources, agencies, departments and programs within the school system to help guide their decisions and educate them about available resources.
